Neithercut Philanthropy Advisors to Pioneer New Planning Tool for Family Foundations

Detroit -- May 11, 2011 – Neithercut Philanthropy Advisors LLC, with offices in Detroit and Chicago, has been selected by Max M. & Marjorie S. Fisher Foundation of Southfield, Michigan to implement the National Center for Family Philanthropy's Pursuit of Excellence process. This is the third project awarded by Max M. & Marjorie S. Fisher Foundation to Neithercut Philanthropy.

The Pursuit of Excellence process is the only strategic planning tool designed specifically for family foundations. It is distinct from other tools of its kind, because in addition to assessing current operations of a foundation and helping with their plan for the future, the process gives the trustees of a foundation a way to examine how family roles and family dynamics shape its operations. The National Center for Family Philanthropy developed the process and pilot-tested it with a number of family foundations. Since the pilot phase was completed, Neithercut Philanthropy Advisors will be the first firm in the United States to implement the Pursuit of Excellence process for a family foundation.

Neithercut Philanthropy Advisors (NPA) works with foundation and charitable individuals to create strategies for effective rewarding philanthropy. NPA is one of only 20 firms in the U.S. that has completed the National Center for Family Philanthropy training necessary to lead a family foundation through the Pursuit of Excellence assessment process.
